

Yet Violet cannot reconcile herself to a life spent caring for her grieving, embittered mother. After countless meals of boiled eggs and dry toast, she saves enough to move out of her mother's place and into the town of Winchester, home to one of England's grandest cathedrals. There, Violet is drawn into a society of broderers—women who embroider kneelers for the Cathedral, carrying on a centuries—long tradition of bringing comfort to worshippers.

Violet finds support and community in the group, fulfillment in the work they create, and even a growing friendship with the vivacious Gilda. But when forces threaten her new independence and another war appears on the horizon, Violet must fight to put down roots in a place where women aren't expected to grow.

Book Club is currently meeting in person! Zoom is an option for members who would like to join the group from a remote location. Monthly Book Club details will be emailed and posted on Facebook.



Memories define us. So what if you lost yours every time you went to sleep? And the one person you trust may be telling you only half the story. Welcome to Christine's life. Every morning, she awakens beside a stranger in an unfamiliar bed. She sees a middle-aged face in the bathroom mirror that she does not recognize. And every morning, the man patiently explains that he is Ben, her husband, that she is forty-seven-years-old, and that an accident long ago damaged her ability to remember.

In place of memories Christine has a handful of pictures, a whiteboard in the kitchen, and a journal, hidden in a closet. Inside its pages, the damaged woman has begun meticulously recording her daily events—sessions with Dr. Nash, snippets of information that Ben shares, flashes of her former self that briefly, miraculously appear.



ANNUAL REPORT

OCTOBER, 2021 TO SEPTEMBER, 2022

The impact of Covid-19 continued to impact the Library and its community. The staff continued to serve the public with in-person services and filling reserve requests through the catalog, and over the phone. When the public was ready, they again returned to enjoy Morton-James Public Library and all that it offers.

Overall, statistically our reports show that we experienced solid increases in most categories.

These categories include Library Visitors and Guests; Circulation; Members; New Library Cards; Amount saved; Reference questions answered and Volunteer Hours/Volunteer Value.

Further analysis is that some categories exceeded 2019-20 pre-Covid reported statistics. These included the Visitor Count; Wi-fi use; Number of Programs and exhibits; Attendance for programs and exhibits; New Library Cards and Amount saved by the patrons.

The Board and staff's efforts paid off and the 125th Anniversary year will go down in the record books as a comeback season. We did not let the Pandemic beat us.

*Objective criteria were used in making weeding decisions, such as publication date, circulation history and physical condition of the resource. Statistics on weeding are reported by the Library in the Nebraska Library Association's Public Libraries Survey. This process often leads to higher circulation of materials and is needed to make sure the collection stays current, vital and attractive to patrons.





Remembering why I became a Librarian



My hometown library sits at the corner of 10th Street and 1st Corso in Nebraska City, but it also resides prominently in my memories of childhood. It is where I first met Tom Sawyer, Robin Hood, The Boxcar Children, Henry Huggins, and later Carl Sandburg, John Steinbeck, George Orwell, and where I would ultimately fall in love with reading.

On almost all of my visits to the library I would spend some time admiring two wooden sailing ships situated high on a shelf, safely beyond my reach. Their sails were permanently billowing. These ships captured my imagination. To my ten-year-old mind there was something magical about them, almost mystical. I imagined launching them in a stream with with me in charge of a crew of small sailors. It has been 68 years since I was ten years old.

The library has nearly doubled in size, with a beautiful addition that perfectly matches the original architecture. The library's interior layout has changed a number of times over the years. The ships I found so enchanting disappeared long ago. That is, until I mentioned them to library director Donna Kruse this week. After I described the ships to her, and told how they had captured my imagination, she conducted a short search.

After a couple of trips to the library attic, Donna located them. Thank you, Donna. Your kindness and extra effort made an old man as happy as a ten-year-old!
